Formulas:

- $\sin(x) \cos(x) = \frac{1}{2} \sin(2x)$
- $\sin^2(\theta) + \cos^2(\theta) = 1$
- $\tan^2(\theta) + 1 = \sec^2(\theta)$
- $\cos^2(\theta) = \frac{1}{2}(1 + \cos(2\theta))$
- $\sin^2(\theta) = \frac{1}{2}(1 - \cos(2\theta))$
- $\int \tan(x) dx = \ln |\sec(x)| + C$
- $\int \sec(x) dx = \ln |\sec(x) + \tan(x)| + C$
- $\int \frac{dx}{x^2+a^2} = \frac{1}{a} \arctan\left(\frac{x}{a}\right) + C$

1. (12 points) Find the area contained between the curves $y = x^3$ and $y = 4x$.

$$x^3 = 4x \implies x(x^2 - 4) = 0 \implies x(x+2)(x-2) = 0$$
$$\implies x = -2, 0, 2$$

$$\int_{-2}^2 |x^3 - 4x| dx = \int_{-2}^0 x^3 - 4x dx + \int_0^2 4x - x^3 dx$$
$$= \left[\frac{x^4}{4} - 2x^2 \right]_{x=-2}^{x=0} + \left[2x^2 - \frac{x^4}{4} \right]_{x=0}^{x=2}$$
$$= \left[(0-0) - \left(\frac{16}{4} - 8 \right) \right] + \left[\left(8 - \frac{16}{4} \right) - (0-0) \right]$$
$$= 8$$

2. (12 points) A spring has a natural length of 2m. A force of 30N is needed to stretch the spring to a length of 3m.

(a) Find the work, in Joules, required to stretch the spring from 3m to 4m.

$$F(x) = kx$$

$$30\text{N} = k(1\text{m})$$

$$\Rightarrow 30 = k$$

$$\int_3^4 30x \, dx$$

$$= 15x^2 \Big|_{x=3}^{x=4}$$

$$= 15(16 - 9)$$

$$= 105$$

(b) Now find the work, in Joules, required to stretch the spring from 3m to $(3+c)$ m, where c is a positive constant.

$$\int_3^{(3+c)} 30x \, dx = 15x^2 \Big|_{x=3}^{x=3+c} = 15((3+c)^2 - 3^2)$$

3. (10 points) Find the area underneath the curve $y = e^{\sqrt{x}}$ from $x = 0$ to $x = 1$.

$$\int_0^1 e^{\sqrt{x}} dx \stackrel{\text{substitution}}{\downarrow} = \int_0^1 2u e^u du$$

$$u^2 = x$$

$$2u du = dx$$

$$w = 2u$$

$$dw = 2 du$$

$$dv = e^u du$$

$$v = e^u$$

$$= 2u e^u \Big|_{u=0}^{u=1} - \int_0^1 2 e^u du$$

$$= 2e - (2e^u \Big|_{u=0}^{u=1})$$

$$= 2e - (2e - 2)$$

$$= 2$$

4. (13 points) The region between the x -axis and the curve $y = \sin(x)$ for $0 \leq x \leq \pi$ is rotated about the x -axis. Compute the volume.

$$\int_0^{\pi} \pi (\sin(x))^2 dx = \pi \int_0^{\pi} \frac{1 - \cos(2\theta)}{2} d\theta$$

$$= \frac{\pi}{2} \int_0^{\pi} 1 - \cos(2\theta) d\theta$$

$$= \frac{\pi}{2} \left(\theta - \frac{\sin(2\theta)}{2} \right) \Bigg|_{\theta=0}^{\theta=\pi}$$

$$= \frac{\pi}{2} \left((\pi - 0) - (0 - 0) \right)$$

$$= \frac{\pi^2}{2}$$

5. (13 points) The region between the x -axis and the curve $y = \sin(x)$ for $0 \leq x \leq \pi$ is rotated about the line $x = -1$. Compute the volume.

$$\begin{aligned} & \int_0^{\pi} 2\pi(1+x) \sin(x) dx = 2\pi \left(\int_0^{\pi} \sin(x) dx + \int_0^{\pi} x \sin(x) dx \right) \\ &= 2\pi \left(-\cos(x) \Big|_{x=0}^{x=\pi} + (-x\cos(x)) \Big|_{x=0}^{x=\pi} + \int_0^{\pi} \cos(x) dx \right) \\ &= 2\pi (2 + \pi + 0) \\ &= 4\pi + 2\pi^2 \end{aligned}$$

6. (13 points) Find the following definite integrals.

(a)

$$\int_0^{\pi/4} \sec^4(\theta) \tan^4(\theta) d\theta$$

$$\int_0^{\pi/4} (1 + \tan^2 \theta) \tan^4 \theta \sec^2 \theta d\theta$$

$$u = \tan \theta$$

$$du = \sec^2 \theta d\theta$$

$$= \int_0^1 (1 + u^2) u^4 du = \int_0^1 u^4 + u^6 du$$

$$= \left. \frac{u^5}{5} + \frac{u^7}{7} \right|_{u=0}^{u=1} = \frac{1}{5} + \frac{1}{7}$$

(b)

$$\int_0^{\pi} x^2 \cos(x) dx$$

$$u_1 = x^2$$

$$dv_1 = \cos(x) dx$$

$$du_1 = 2x dx$$

$$v_1 = \sin(x)$$

$$x^2 \sin(x) \Big|_{x=0}^{x=\pi} - \int_0^{\pi} 2x \sin(x) dx =$$

$$= 0 - \int_0^{\pi} 2x \sin(x) dx = - \left(-2x \cos(x) \Big|_{x=0}^{x=\pi} + \int_0^{\pi} 2 \cos(x) dx \right)$$

$$u_2 = 2x$$

$$dv_2 = \sin(x) dx$$

$$du_2 = 2 dx$$

$$v_2 = -\cos(x)$$

$$= - (2\pi + 0)$$

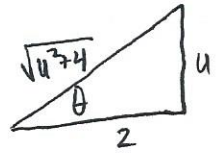
$$= -2\pi$$

7. (15 points) Find the following indefinite integrals.

(a)

$$\int \frac{dx}{\sqrt{x^2 - 6x + 13}}$$

$$\int \frac{dx}{\sqrt{(x-3)^2 + 4}} \quad \begin{array}{l} u = x-3 \\ du = dx \end{array} \rightarrow \int \frac{du}{\sqrt{u^2 + 4}}$$



$$\begin{array}{l} u = 2 \tan \theta \\ du = 2 \sec^2 \theta d\theta \end{array} \Rightarrow \frac{u}{2} = \tan \theta$$

$$\xrightarrow{2} \int \frac{1}{2 \sec \theta} \cdot 2 \sec^2 \theta d\theta = \int \sec \theta d\theta = \ln |\sec \theta + \tan \theta| + C$$

$$= \ln \left| \frac{\sqrt{u^2 + 4}}{2} + \frac{u}{2} \right| + C = \ln \left| \frac{\sqrt{(x-3)^2 + 4} + (x-3)}{2} \right| + C$$

(b)

$$\int \frac{dx}{\sqrt{-x^2 + 6x - 5}}$$

$$= \int \frac{dx}{\sqrt{4 - (x-3)^2}} \quad \begin{array}{l} x-3 = 2 \sin \theta \\ dx = 2 \cos \theta d\theta \end{array} \rightarrow \int \frac{1}{2 \cos \theta} \cdot 2 \cos \theta d\theta$$

$$= \theta + C$$

$$= \arcsin \left(\frac{x-3}{2} \right) + C$$

8. (12 points)

(a) Find the following indefinite integral.

$$\int \frac{x^2 - 2x - 1}{(x-1)(x^2+1)} dx$$

Partial Fraction:

$$\frac{x^2 - 2x - 1}{(x-1)(x^2+1)} = \frac{A}{x-1} + \frac{Bx+C}{x^2+1}$$

$$\rightarrow \int \frac{-1}{x-1} + \frac{-2x}{x^2+1} dx$$

$$x^2 - 2x - 1 = A(x^2+1) + (Bx+C)(x-1) = \ln \left| \frac{1}{x-1} \right| + \ln \left(\frac{1}{x^2+1} \right) + C$$

$$\begin{array}{l} \underline{x=1} \\ -2 = 2A \\ -1 = A \end{array}$$

$$\begin{array}{l} \underline{x=0} \\ -1 = -1 + (-C) \\ C = 0 \end{array}$$

$$\begin{array}{l} \underline{x=-1} \\ 2 = -2 + (-2)B \\ -2 = B \end{array}$$

(b) Set up the partial fraction decomposition for the following integral in terms of variables, but do not solve for those variables.

$$\int \frac{x^2 - 5x + 16}{(x^2+1)^2(x^2-1)^2(x-1)^2} dx$$

$$\frac{x^2 - 5x + 16}{(x^2+1)^2(x+1)^2 \underbrace{(x-1)^2(x-1)^2}_{(x-1)^4}} = \frac{A+B}{x^2+1} + \frac{Cx+D}{(x^2+1)^2} + \frac{E}{x+1} + \frac{F}{(x+1)^2} + \frac{G}{x-1} + \frac{H}{(x-1)^2} + \frac{I}{(x-1)^3} + \frac{J}{(x-1)^4}$$
